Key Takeaways

Leverage good data practices and strategies to support health equity. When operationalized in thoughtful ways, timely and high-quality data has the potential to uncover weaknesses in the healthcare system and <u>address inequities</u> at the local, state, and national levels. Because healthcare programs like Medicaid often rely on ground level systems to facilitate quality data collection, <u>engagement and support must be prioritized in these local levels.</u> Unfortunately, public health data is not always available due to <u>barriers in data sharing restrictions and staffing limitations</u>, making increasing data accessibility a critical first step.

Include and amplify the right voices in health equity conversations. To change the conversation on health equity, we must include the right players at the table. This means pulling providers – who best understand clinics' needs – into data collection conversations as well as including day-to-day staff over transient leaders in health equity strategies. It is critical for state Medicaid and public health programs to practice authentic engagement with the community and encourage sustained community member engagement in health equity planning. As a community member, one way to remain engaged in health equity planning is to submit

comments to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) when proposed decisions are released for Medicare and Medicaid services.

Embed health equity across the entire healthcare system. To achieve health equity, all healthcare must prioritize reducing disparities at every level. This often means finding the right incentives to encourage this behavior in healthcare organizations. No matter the sector, health equity work must become normalized in order for its influence to become known. Intentionally thinking about how equity is and should be embedded in healthcare research and policymaking is necessary to create sustainable change.
